The East Anglia Air War Project in Shalford

The East Anglia Air War Project (hereafter referred to as EAAWP) began in 2001 to support an oral history interview program of veterans of the Eighth Air Force in England and also the British people who lived in the villages and town across East Anglia and west into the Midlands during World War II. Later, the Project expanded to include the Ninth Air Force. Along the way, the EAAWP established programming at venues throughout East Anglia. These activities included documentary film premieres, exhibitions, speeches and talks, erecting memorials, and scheduling meetings to update British communities in rural villages and towns about the World War II history work being done by the EAAWP.

In 2008, a memorial stone was placed in the church yard at Shalford in memory of the crew of the *Dry Gulcher* who came down in Shalford village area on August 4, 1944. Crew families designed the memorial and sponsored its placement in Shalford. On hand for the dedication were a number of crew family members, and the EAAWP worked with the Shalford History Committee to plan a memorial service at the memorial site and an evening exhibition and program in the village hall to celebrate the occasion. The program included a sneak preview of the film, *Dry Gulcher Down*, then in production, and a multiple-panel photograph exhibition. The exhibition is reproduced here in the following pages.











Largest Surviving Pieces of the Dry Gulcher (The "E" was Part of the 532nd Squadron Marking near the Waist Gun Position)










DRY GULCHER CREWMAN RETURNS TO THE CRASH SITE AT SHALFORD










On the morning of 4 August 1944 Audrey Sparrow set off on her bicycle to deliver the mail to her patrons along her assigned Shalford postal route. As she approached Water Hall Lane (marked as X), an American military policeman stopped her and escorted to her final deliveries, not far from the wreckage site (marked as XX).

Mr. Peter Morgan, who once lived at the Old Vicarage, described how, as a boy during the war, he remembered the USAF bomber crashing near Shalford Hall. Before the crash the plane had flopped over and flew on its back and they saw all the parachutes floating down.


When the plane did crash, his mother,
Mrs. Sybil Morgan and Albert Tarbin were
first on the scene. Peter followed them as
they disappeared into the smoke near the
Hall. There were explosions constantly as
the plane was fully loaded for a bombing
raid and was on its way out when a fire
broke out in the cockpit. No one was found
in the area, but Mrs. Morgan noticed a
rucksack with something soft and nastylooking in it and she feared the worst
before she discovered it was melting
chocolate.


Peter's mother told him to go home and when he returned to the house, Peter thought that it seemed to be raining in the kitchen. The house, of course, was very old and shaky, and it had a huge galvanized reservoir in the roof which had rusted so thin that the shock of the plane crash caused it to leak, with water flooding through the ceiling.

It was much later that Peter found the oxygen tank from the Dry Gulcher in the garden behind Shalford Hall (pictured above).
